2022 Continuum of Care Grant Proposed Grant Application

New Permanent Supportive Housing, Rapid Re-Housing, and Domestic Violence Bonus Funding, and CoC Bonus Funding

South Dakota Housing for the Homeless Consortium is currently soliciting applications for Permanent Supportive Housing, Rapid Re-Housing, Joint Transitional Housing Rapid Rehousing, Domestic Violence Bonus Projects and CoC Bonus Projects. Applicants should utilize a Housing First approach for assisting people experiencing homelessness. Eligible projects include:

- New Permanent Supportive Housing (PSH) projects that meet the requirements where 100 percent of the beds are dedicated to individuals and families experiencing chronic homelessness.
- New Rapid Re-housing projects (RRH) that will serve homeless individuals and families, including unaccompanied youth. Projects may provide joint Transitional and Rapid Re-housing.
- New projects for Domestic Violence (DV) Bonus funding to provide housing or support services for Coordinated Entry for survivors of domestic violence, dating violence, and stalking. Projects may provide Rapid Re-housing, joint Transitional and Rapid Re-housing, or Support Services only for Coordinated Entry (SSO-CES).

<u>Housing First Definition:</u> A homeless assistance approach that is guided by the belief that people need basic necessities like housing, before attending to less critical issues. Housing First asserts that client choice is valuable in the selection of housing and support services participation. Support services are offered, but participation is not required as a condition to receive housing services. Homelessness is understood as first and foremost a housing crisis.

<u>Permanent Supportive Housing Definition:</u> Permanent housing intervention with indefinite leasing or rental assistance paired with supportive services to assist those experiencing homelessness with a disability, or families with an adult or child member with a disability, achieve housing stability.

Rapid Re-Housing Definition: Permanent housing intervention that emphasizes housing search and relocation services and short and medium term rental assistance to move homeless persons and families (with or without a disability) as quickly as possible into permanent housing. RRH connects families and individuals experiencing homelessness to permanent housing and tailored assistance that is time-limited. Project goals in RRH for those experiencing homelessness; obtain housing quickly, increase self-sufficiency, and remain housed.

Funding will come from the US Department of Housing and Urban Development, Office of Community Planning and Development. Information on the CoC Program can be found at https://www.hudexchange.info/programs/coc/. The definitions used in this application were also obtained from this source. Funds can be used for new construction, rehabilitation, operating, and leasing. Please carefully read the description for this funding program before completing an application. Supportive Service expenses for housing programs should be extremely limited and applicants should consider including funding for supportive services from additional sources.

Pre-Application

Pre-Application deadline is 5:00 p.m. (CST), Friday, August 19, 2022. Incomplete applications will not be accepted. Selection Process:

No funding will be awarded based on a Pre-Application. Prior to the full application process, pre-applications will be reviewed for basic program eligibility, the amount of funding available and other criteria by the Policy and Advisory Committee (PAC). The PAC is the governing board of South Dakota Housing for the Homeless Consortium and is comprised of formerly homeless people and community/state professionals. South Dakota Housing Development Authority staff serves as support for the PAC.

The pre-application will convey basic information on the proposal to help determine its eligibility for HUD funding, relationship to the South Dakota Housing for the Homeless Consortium goals, project feasibility, applicant experience and capacity to undertake the project in a timely manner.

Eligible Applicants: Pre-applications will only be accepted from eligible public non-profit agencies, private non-profit agencies, units of government and public housing authorities. A private non-profit is any agency with tax-exempt status under Section 501(c)(3) of the IRS code. Tribes, tribal housing authorities and for profit entities are ineligible for Continuum of Care funding.

Applicants must understand that the type and amount of funding requested will significantly impact the entire South Dakota Housing for the Homeless Consortium application and its competitiveness for funding. Please read the following very carefully:

- Capital Funding: Funding for acquisition, rehabilitation, and new construction. Projects
 requesting capital funding may be single site or scattered site housing models.
 However, if the project also requires funding for operations or supportive services, refer
 to Items 2 and 3 below. A high-quality proposal that requests capital funding but has
 assurances of adequate funding from other sources for supportive services may rank
 higher in the selection process.
- 2. Operating Funding: Operating costs are those associated with the day-to-day operation of the supportive housing project.
- 3. Service Funding: Supportive Housing Program (SHP) funding for supportive services is extremely limited. To be considered for higher ranking, applicants should consider maximizing other (non SHP) funding for the service portion of the application.

Completing this application does not automatically qualify your proposed project for inclusion into the 2021 Continuum of Care Grant process. The Policy and Advisory Committee (PAC) for the Housing for the Homeless Consortium will use this information to make determinations of eligibility only.
