These services have been funded by federal agencies, including but not limited to the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration, to implement peer support specialist services in Northeast and Southeast Wyoming and to implement Medication Assisted Treatment services in interprofessional collaboration with the Sheridan Memorial Hospital, the Bureau of Prison's to run a Residential Community Correctional Facility known as Booth Hall in Gillette, Wyoming, and the Department of Labor and Veteran Affairs to facilitate homeless outreach services. These grants and contracts, in particular, require meticulous administrative, financial, and operational oversight to ensure VOA meets all federal agencies' expectations, obligations, policies, and responsibilities under the grant term.

VOA's administrative oversight through program managers ensures VOA is in grant compliance and fidelity with all laws, regulations, and policies, including managing the application and proposal process, monitoring compliance, and reporting progress, goals, objectives, and outcomes to Government Project Officers. VOA's financial oversight, which includes the program managers and financial personnel, involves managing the budget and financial reports to ensure there is appropriate accounting and record-keeping, tracking expenses, and ensuring that funds are being used in accordance with the funder. Further, VOA's operational oversight involves all key personnel to ensure that personnel have the necessary resources, systems, and processes in place to ensure clients receive optimal services.

VOA's Housing Assistance Program has been in operation for the last three years and is fundamentally predicated on the evidence-based and culturally competent practice known as Housing First. This approach includes providing homeless prevention, rapid re-housing, and emergency shelter, prioritizing permanent and sustainable housing for individuals who are at risk of homelessness or who may suffer from homelessness in conjunction with delivering recovery-oriented services through VOA's Program Manager and Housing Service Coordinators. This program, in particular, serves youth, veterans, seniors, adults, and individuals who may identify as LGBTQIA2S+. Further, housing first recognizes that individuals cannot achieve stability or address other issues, such as mental health or substance abuse concerns until they have safe and stable housing. Housing Service Coordinators and VOA's Program Manager also assist clients with navigating through the healthcare system in Rapid City to ensure clients access the necessary resources and support to address other challenges that may impact housing stability and improve clients' overall quality of life and functioning.

2. Describe your organization's (and subrecipient(s) if applicable) experience in leveraging Federal, State, local and private sector funds.

As stated previously, VOA has tremendous experience in leveraging a multitude of funding sources to support VOA's Housing Assistance Program and other programs in Wyoming and South Dakota through Federal, State, Local, and foundation funds. VOA has contracted with the Wyoming Department of Health to provide outpatient mental health services in our nine outpatient clinics, and residential substance abuse treatment to both men and women in our Life House and Gathering Place treatment facilities, and Intensive Outpatient Programming (IOP) to clients in our outpatient clinics in Northeast and Southeast Wyoming. Additionally, VOA is currently contracted with the Wyoming Department of Corrections to facilitate IOP treatment programming in Goshen County and Johnson County jails, which requires annual and monthly reporting. Daniel's Fund, which is VOA's largest foundation, provides annual funding for homeless outreach services and for residential treatment services, which require quarterly reports. Additionally, VOA has a federal pass-through grant from the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration to facilitate MAT services and a second federal grant to implement and evaluate peer support specialist services. All of these funders require comprehensive oversight and meticulous allocation of funding to ensure clients' needs are met. Additionally, VOA has a federal pass-through grant to facilitate Ryan White Services for the South Dakota Department of Health, and HIV prevention services for clients at risk of being diagnosed with HIV in Rapid City.

Effective public financial management ensures that VOA funds are used to deliver services as effectively and efficiently as possible. VOA has a comprehensive financial structure that occurs in four separate stages: first in budget planning, where program managers collaborate with the finance department to strategically budget and prepare the budget for funders and that all budget item categories coincide with the funder's policies, the budget approval and agreement between the funder and VOA, third the implementation of the budget with the processes of financial reports, internal control, resource capacity, and accounting associated with the funder, and lastly, budget evaluation which involves the process of external auditing with our contractors and funders as necessary. These processes of budget planning, execution, and process evaluation ensure that programmatic personnel, the funder, and VOA's financial department are in accordance with the funder's policies and regulations. In addition to the budget process, VOA has a comprehensive financial department that plays a critical role in monitoring and analyzing all grant and contract financial performance by using an interdepartmental approach to ensure truthful and valid cost estimation. This monitoring allows program managers to make informed decisions about programs and services to improve and adapt to the changing needs of the clients served. Ultimately, VOA's financial department is an integral part of VOA's strategic plan and grant strategy, which can provide the highest quality care and support to those in need.

In this RFP titled: FY 2023 Continuum of Care Competition and Renewal or Replacement of Youth Homeless Demonstration Program Grants Department of Housing and Urban Development, Volunteers of America Northern Rockies (VOA) proposes to plan, implement, and evaluate Rapid Re-housing (RRH) services for individuals and families experiencing homelessness. This program aims to decrease the prevalence of homeless individuals and families living in unsheltered areas, whether in their cars or in other places not meant for habitation. In conjunction with RRH, VOA offers comprehensive, intensive case management spending an average of 8-10 hours a week per client, crisis interventions, referrals, and linkage to care and offers access to crisis intervention, client navigation, and emergency resources. VOA utilizes multiple evidence-based practices with clients that are fundamentally predicated on the Housing First Model, assertive outreach, motivational interviewing, and intensive case management. Intensive case management is a type of intervention that offers coordinated and comprehensive support to individuals who are suffering from homelessness, which involves an individualized assessment of the person's needs, followed by the development of a treatment plan that includes a range of services, goals, accountability, and support. Priority populations include homeless families with school-aged children. households with vulnerable health conditions, homeless veterans, transitional youth aged 18-24, and individuals entering or exiting treatment services. Case managers will continuously evaluate the client's social determinants of health, support system, and service navigation to meet basic needs and work collaboratively with an interdisciplinary team of providers to address secondary barriers (substance abuse, mental health, etc.) that can prevent success in permanent housing.

The total amount of funding that VOA is requesting is \$187,000. These funds will be allocated for community-based rapid rehousing for individuals and families experiencing homelessness in Western South Dakota, utilizing a Housing First model.

The type of housing that VOA proposes is community-based housing through the rental market in Western South Dakota. VOA has established relationships with landlords in the area for access to available inventory.

The need for these services is demonstrated through the Point-In-Time (PIT) count that is conducted each year throughout the state of South Dakota. The PIT count indicates an increase in homelessness in Rapid City by 41% from 2020 to 2023. VOA has partnerships with a multitude of prominent service providers across Western South Dakota that will support the efforts of this project.

Approximately 45% of the clients are expected to come from households that are unsheltered, meaning they live on the streets, in their cars, or in other unsuitable locations. Another 25% will come from emergency shelters, 5% from transitional housing, and the remaining 25% will be reached through street outreach efforts.

This project will improve the overall performance of the homeless system in the State of South Dakota by ensuring that rapid-rehousing services are effective and efficient in transitioning individuals who are homeless into sustainable housing. At this time, VOA is the only agency in Western South Dakota providing Rapid Re-housing Services.

Program participants will receive comprehensive assistance to ensure the highest probability of successful sustainable housing in the intermediate to long term by utilizing the evidence-based practice known as housing first, specifically through rapid re-housing. VOA's Housing Assistance Program is fundamentally predicated on five components: one by recruiting landlords in the local Rapid City Community and finding appropriate and sustainable housing, which the Program Manager and Housing Service Coordinators have built these relationships for the last 3 years, two by offering access to case management at home, the VOA office or in the community, three by providing assertive community outreach by meeting clients where they are at whether it is unsheltered or sheltered, four by providing warm-hand offs and client navigation through the healthcare system to ensure biomedical and social support needs are met, and lastly by providing life skills training through budgeting assistance, employment support, and other recovery-oriented services. The homeless literature has concluded this intervention to be more efficacious and costefficient than traditional medical model interventions and has been shown to reduce the recidivism of homelessness. Additionally, all homeless outreach personnel are trained in motivational interviewing, assertive outreach concepts and constructs, and receive training in the most up-to-date interventions. Through interprofessional collaboration with community partnerships across the continuum of care, an evidence-based paradigm that has been shown to be efficacious, competent personnel, and formidable relationships with local landlords, this program is designed to be as optimal as possible for clients in Rapid City.

2. Describe the specific plan to coordinate and integrate with other mainstream health, social services, and employment programs for which program participants may be eligible.

VOA's Housing Assistance Program is predicated on interprofessional collaborative practice to ensure that clients are able to access all forms of biomedical and social support services in the community. VOA's Program Manager and Housing Service Coordinators for the last three years have been vigorously establishing and bolstering relationships with the Black Hills Regional Homeless Coalition, the Rapid City Police Department, the Rapid City Fire Department, Pennington County Health & Human Services, Rapid City Area Schools, McKinney Vento, Journey On Street Outreach, The Circle Drop-In Center, Behavior Management Services, Great Plains Tribal Leaders Health Board, and RCPD Quality of Life Unit, and many more relationships to ensure optimal quality services across the continuum of care. VOA's Housing Assistance Program promotes interprofessional collaboration for the success of this program, and it is critical to develop partnerships with healthcare or social professionals by attending coalition and interprofessional meetings, attending homeless outreach events in Rapid City, facilitating trainings, and increasing awareness of VOA's program by cold-calling organizations. Due to these strategies, VOA has been able to reap the benefits of interprofessional collaboration and coordinating care by increasing access to care for services and new resources, gaining wisdom from others to improve homeless outreach efforts, and to increase productivity and reduce duplication of services, and is able to mainstream numerous services in the community.

New in FY2023, the Violence Against Women Act (VAWA) has clarified the use of CoC Program funds for VAWA eligible cost categories. - Housing Fees. Grant funds can be used to pay fees associated with getting survivors into a safe unit via emergency transfer(s), including but not limited to application fees, broker fees, holding fees, trash fees, pet fees where the person believes they need their pet to be safe, etc.

- Case Management. Grant funds can be used to pay staff time necessary to assess, coordinate, and implement emergency transfer(s).

- Housing Navigation. Grant funds can be used to pay staff time necessary to identify safe units and facilitate moves into housing for survivors through emergency transfer(s).
